

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

One of many $1\frac{1}{2}$ -story colonial cottages although earlier in date than most 1780. Basic characteristics of 5-bay cottage with original central chimney and 12 over 12 lights. Cinderblock side chimney added later and detracts from main house.

 $\hbox{HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE} \quad \hbox{Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.}$

Two simmilar points on the 1853 walling map shows ownership of both a J. Eddy and a Mrs M. Chase, then on the later turn-of-the century 1896 map, a house and barn are noted as belonging to Wm. Cole. This property again was surrounded by Chase family land owners.
