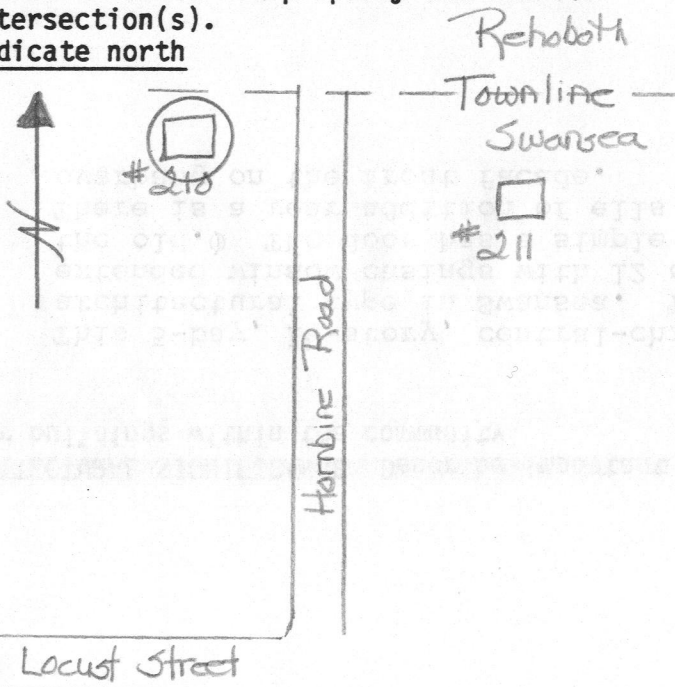

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

This 5-bay, 1½-story, central-chimney cottage is one of many of this architectural type in Swansea. The characteristic features include extended window casings with 12 over 12 lights (probably new but like the old.) The door has a simple wood surround with no detail or lights. There is a rear addition of ells of a later date.. There is a wide eave overhang on the front facade.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

Typical farmstead of the 18th century located in a rural section of Swansea near the Rehoboth border. It is not known who the first owner was, however, the 1895 map has Thomas Parkinson as the owner at that time.
