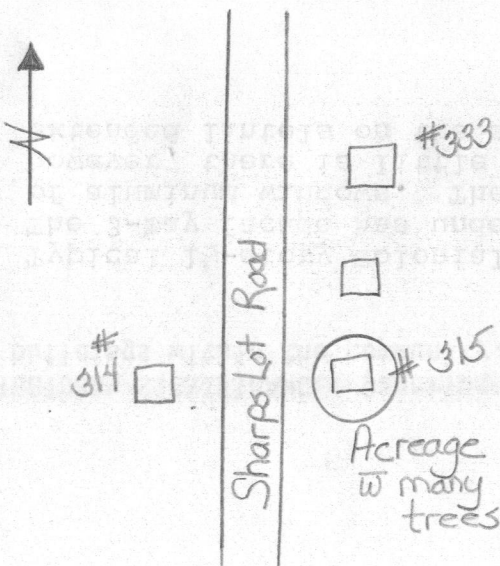
Setting Situated on main north-south road in north-east Swansea, presently a rural area, with little setback from the road. Typical NE stonewall encases front of house.

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

Typical 1½-story Colonial cottage of which there are many in Swansea. The 3-bay facade has undergone some insensitive remodelling with the use of aluminum windows. The original rubblestone foundation is intact, however, there is little architectural detail remaining. There are extended lintels on the side of the house.
