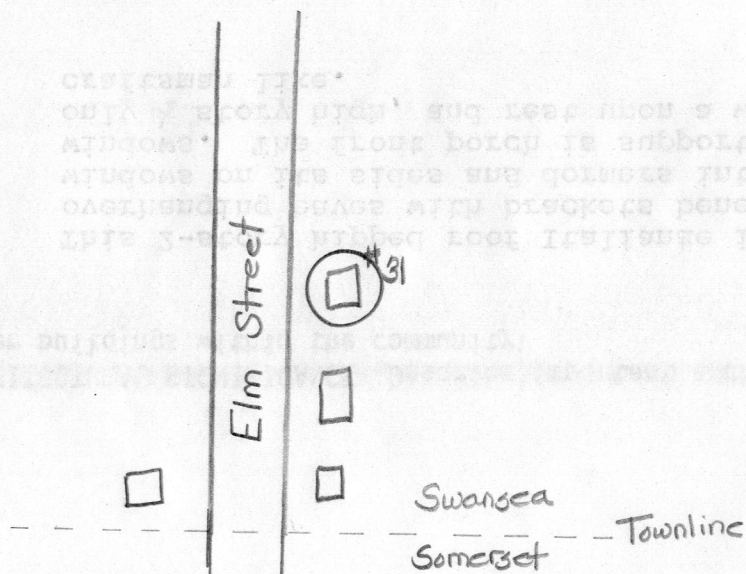

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

This 2-story hipped roof Italiante is typical in that it has very wide overhanging eaves with brackets beneath. It is also 3 ranked with bow windows on its sides and dormers intersecting all roof lines with 3/1 windows. The front porch is supported by chamfered dolumns which are only 1/2 story high, and rest upon a wooden foundation. Typically craftsman like.
