ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

The main three-bay, 1 ½-story gambrel roof structure with a one story porch blended into the main volume of the house has a setback ell. It features two shed dormers on the main house and one on the ell. The piers of the porch are accentuated and shingled. The roof has been re-shingled and detracts from the overall continuity inherent in the Shingle style.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

This house is an example of the more modest shingle style summer residences before 1900. The Consolidated Railroad operated a train between Providence and Fall River with a stop at South Swansea, Which made this area accessible to summer residence in 1898. Harden C. Watters lived in Providence, R.I. and bought ten acres of land from Elizabeth, the widow of Henry Gardner, Jr., who was a descendant of the first Samuel Gardner who settled on Gardner's Neck.
