ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

Typical of the summer colony cottages, this Colonial Revival has many of the previous centuries shingle style characteristics. It has a shingle skin over a ofur-square with a hipped roof on a two-story house. There is a wrap single-story porch and a 3-bay, 1-story ell with chimney off the rear.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

The sigmificance lies in the section of Gardners Neck in which this house is located. It was one of the first areas in town to be inhabited by natives and Colonists alike and in the early 20th century became the area of Swansea for substantial summer cottages. This is one of the few remaining "summer only" cottages. Most all the other homes are now year round.
