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

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

Typical of the farmsteads of the mid-19th century scattered throughout Swansea. The characteristic features of this Cape are the 1½-story, 5-bay basic massing - a practical vernacular building. This was built at approximately the same time as its neighbor #235 and is now rented.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

The Eddy/Baker Farm Complex is the only large working farm remaining in Swansea. It is an intact agricultural setting. The original owners were the Eddys. The Bakers purchased it in 1835. The Hale Farm, across the street, is an original land grant from England. Baker has purchased and leases some of the Hale land. This is only one of the farmsteads on this extensive complex.
