ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

This five-bay,  $2\frac{1}{2}$  - story, central chimney with a later addition of a three-bay, 2 - story, ell is an intact example of an early 19th century residence that was built in north Swansea during this period by and average merchant. The interesting features are the front porch with spindle railing and posts added at a later date and the east side root cellar door. The lintels over the 6 over 6 lights are semi-splayed and molded.
