



The following information was on the original Form B written December 20, 1978:

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE -Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

The Luther Store was built by John Brown Luther in 1815 and was operated by the Luther family until its doors closed in 1903. The Luther family then offered the property to the Town of Swansea and in 1941 the Swansea historical Society became responsible for the Store as a Swansea Museum. The Store originally stood flush with the southeast corner at the crossroads of Luthers Corners and in order to eliminate a blind corner it was moved in 1937 under a WPA project about 50 feet east of its former location. Moving was a ticklish job as the building is built of wood, over which a 4' veneer brick is imposed, and there are three distinct sections to the building, two additions having been made at some time to the central structure.

The original fixture of the general store are in place; solid mahogany counters bins for groceries, drawers which still contain spices. There is an sold bar under the staircase, the desk where Mr. Luther kept his accounts, numerous household items and some Indian artifacts found in Swansea. The back room hold farm implements, musical instruments and is used for special exhibits. A narrow staircase leads to the second floor and upstairs can be found undertaking supplies, shoe making and repair implements, a small library, pictures, furniture and hand woven spreads.


This area of Swansea was "Swansea Center" in early years and the Luther Store was the meeting place for the many local farmers, nearby ministers, seafarers and craftsmen. There were blacksmiths, a showmaker and a cooper in the area and a large piggery. The focus of the town's affairs moved gradually to Swansea Village and Luthers Corners is now a quiet residential spot.
