

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

This intersecting Gambrel roofed, Colonial Revival home is one of three that were built the same time period by the same family. It is decorated with a simple full front porch with doric columns placed on cement piers. The roof has a large over-hang, and a wide freeze band below the eave. The windows are 2 over 1 and there are single shed dormers on all four roof ends. There is a added side room on the south side with 6 over 6 windows and a cement foundation. There is also an added back ell to the house that was built about 20 years ago.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

According to the towns 1895 walling map, a structure was built on this land, but no mention of ownership is listed.
