ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

This vernacular 1½-storu, 3-bay, gable end to street home is typical of the Swansea Center area. Significant architectural details include; wide freeze band under the cornice eave; modest returns; commer boards; slight splayed lintels and 6 over 6 lights in windows. The doorway is topped with a slight overjung lintel and fan light above door.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

This house, being average in size, compared to the rest of the "village" area, is typical of the residential housing. The progression of buildings along Main Street, has been a varied one with both commercial and residential structures enhancing and complementing one another.
