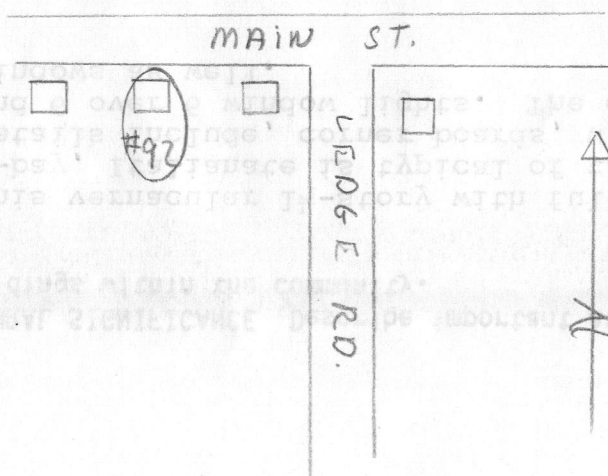

NATIONAL REGISTER CRITERIA STATEMENT (if applicable)

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

This vernacular 1½-story with full shead dormer, gable end to street, 3-bay, Italianate is typical of the area. Architectural significant details include, corner boards, wide freeze band, slight splayed lintels and 6 over 6 window lights. The door possesses matching lintel to the windows as well.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

This house being average in size; compared to the rest of the "village" area, is typical of the residential housing. The progression of buildings along Main Street, has been a varied one, with both commercial and residential structures, enhancing and complementing one another.
