ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

One of the few Neoclassical structure in Swansea is the Frank S. Stevens School, built in 1908. This 1½-story brick structure has the distinguishing features of a front facade dominated by a full-height porch with a pedimented roof supported by classical Doric columns, symmetrically balanced door flanked by 2 windows (6 over 6 lights.) The architectural detailing includes block molding on all eaves of the hipped roof and colonade porch. An 8-sided dome adorns the roof.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

Swansea's school history is significant in the fact that it was mandated that there be a school in the area in 1673. By 1807, 12 regular school districts were set up in various homes. By 1838 the districts were reduced to 10 which was maintained into the 1900's. The Village School was located in the vicinity of the present Jr. High School and was moved to the site of the Frank S. Stevens School. The money for the school was presented to the town by the widow of Frank S. Stevens, the philantropist who changed the face of Swansea Village.
